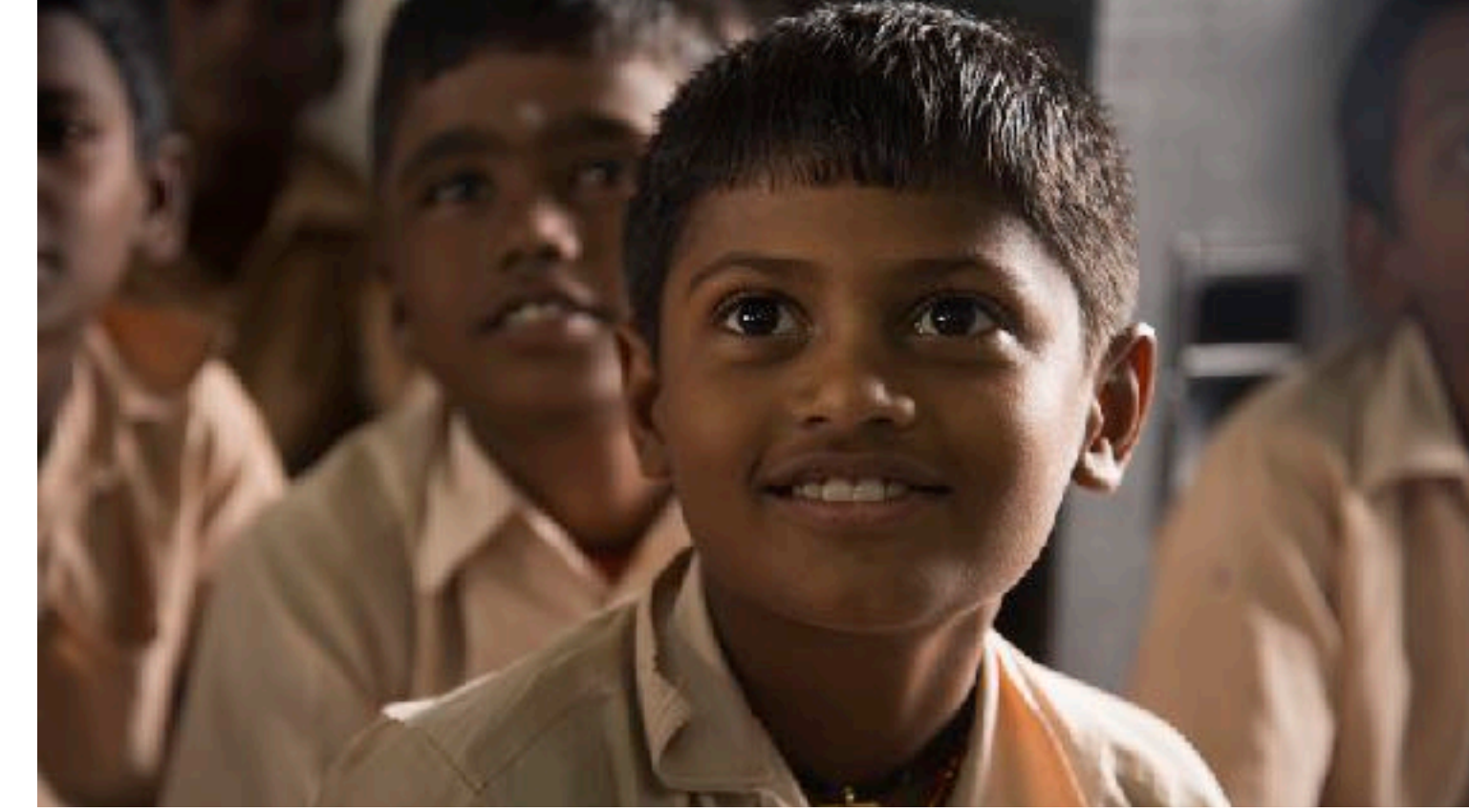

Why Earth Education?

What does Earth Education mean to you?

Does it evoke the image of children being taken on a nature walk?

Or does it evoke images of schools using nature-based learning to teach students?

Does it mean people restoring soil or forests, and realizing the importance of it?

This is Earth Education to us.

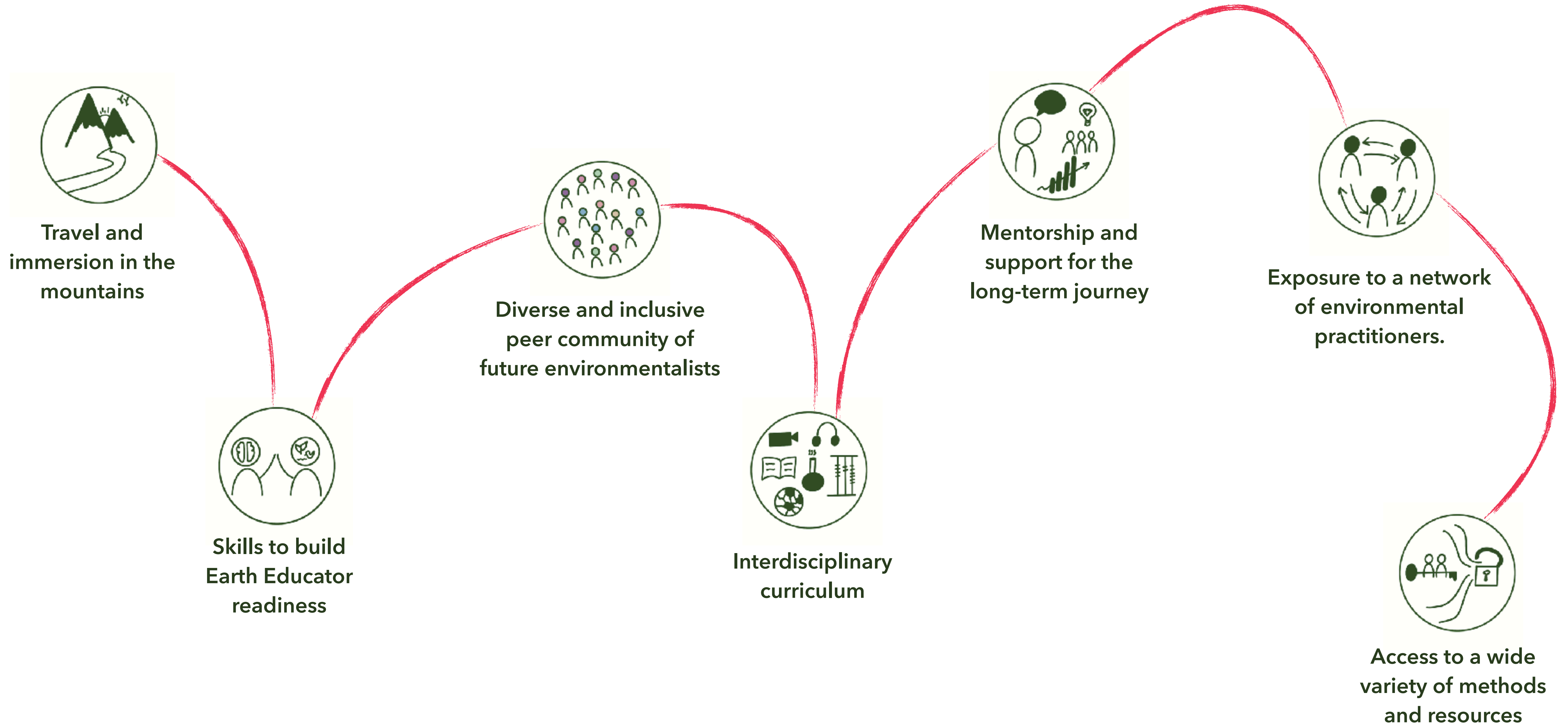
What does Earth Education mean to you?

The Earth Educator

The Earth Educators Fellowship brings together 20 young volunteers for the environment, emerging grassroots conservationists, and schoolteachers passionately educating students about nature. They are invited to embark on an 11-month journey to explore the natural world, curate immersive learning experiences for students, build skills, and a community to lead conservation action in their locality.



The Philosophy

Our desire to offer a one-of-its-kind experience for the participants led us to carefully study Polynesian wayfinding.

About 7000 years ago, Polynesians navigated open-ocean voyages on double-hulled canoes. They used nature to navigate instead of instruments such as a compass. Through intense sailing, about 22 hours a day, for thousands of miles, drawing clues from the wind, waves, stars, clouds, sun, moon, birds, ocean swells, and other signs of nature to know the direction and location of their canoe at sea, Polynesians discovered the Pacific Islands.

At the core of their voyages is a courageous philosophy of exploration. "Once you have the idea, vision, decision, or the destination you are trying to get to, as long as you believe that destination is something that you truly value, then, even though you don't know how to get there, that's part of the journey."

Such a wayfinding philosophy is needed not only for open ocean navigators but for every one of us who has an inclination to protect and restore the natural environment.

Earth Educators Program was conceived after an inspiring conversation with the legendary native Hawaiian navigator Nainoa Thompson who was instrumental in leading the revival of the art and science of wayfinding.

The Earth Educators' journey comprises three stages for which we use the word 'Canoe' as a metaphor for the journey, and 'land,' their destination.

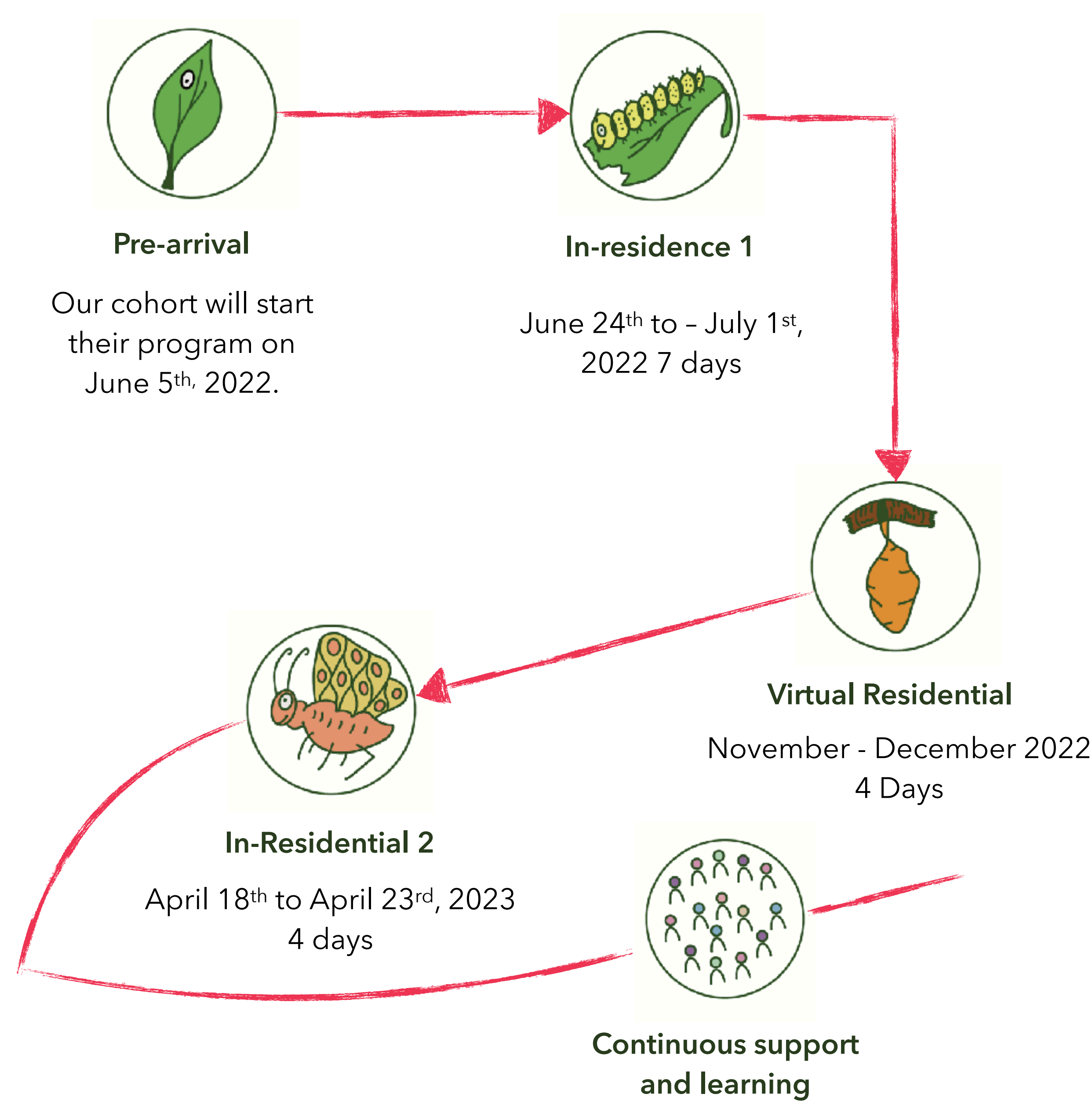

An Experiential and Practice-based Approach



Residential is a short in-person engagement when the Earth Educators, faculty, and the YouCAN team come together in a lush, outdoor environment to learn, try, ideate, reflect, and bond with one another.

Field Time is when Earth Educators apply their residential learning in live projects in schools and their communities. Activities range from documenting biodiversity in their neighbourhood to film screenings and activity-based learning sessions in schools/communities for middle school students.

Immersion in Natural History

Educators who inspire environmental action among students have an aptitude for natural history – a keen observation and inquiry of animals, birds, plants, fungi, butterflies, and all life forms in their natural environment. It is developed through lived experiences through walks.

The fellowship training shares stories of discoveries through walks, provides resources to explore the natural world in the neighbourhood, teaches skills such as citizen science, nature journaling, photo, and video storytelling, and helps Earth Educators create a portfolio of their documentation of local biodiversity.

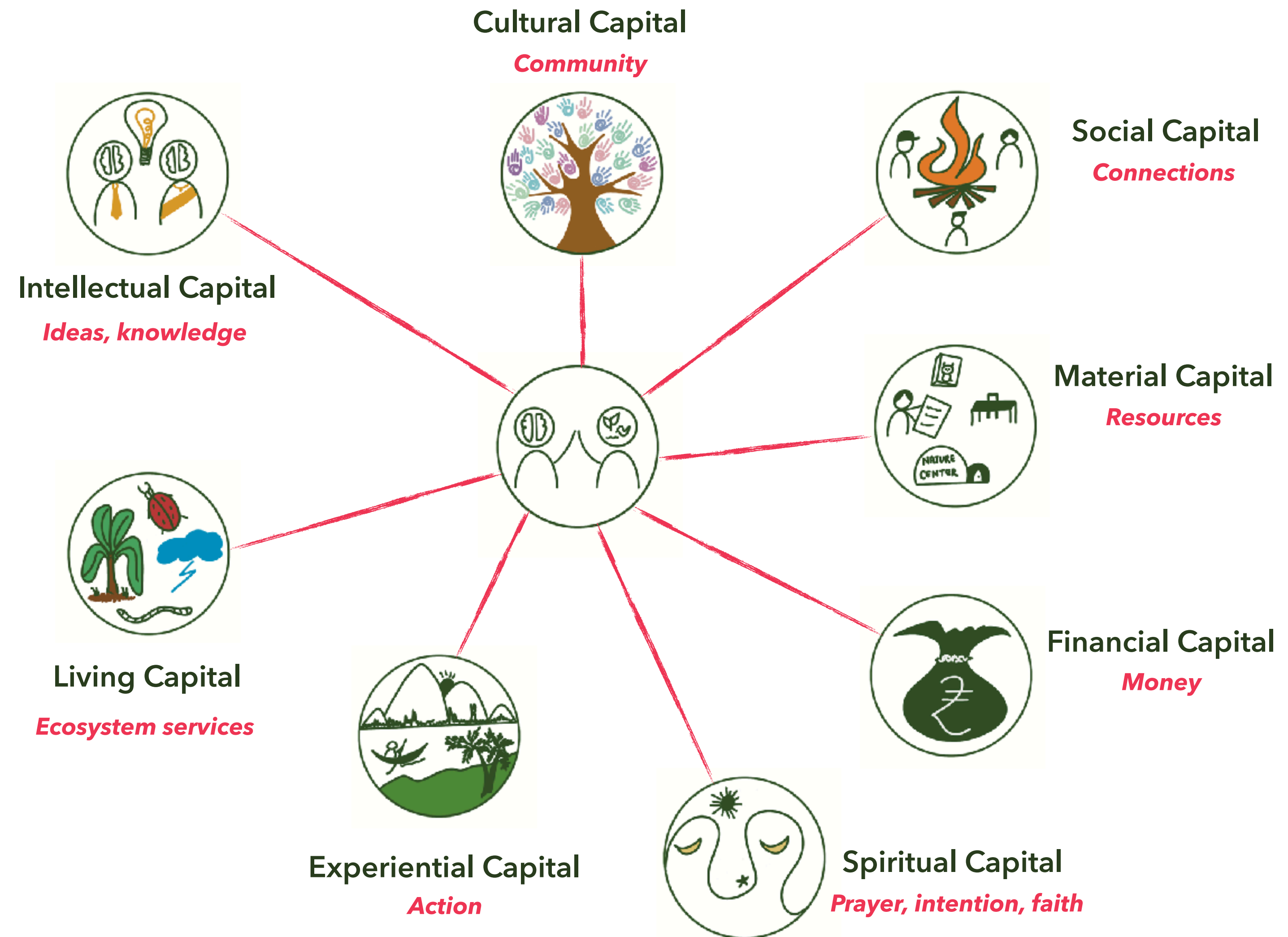

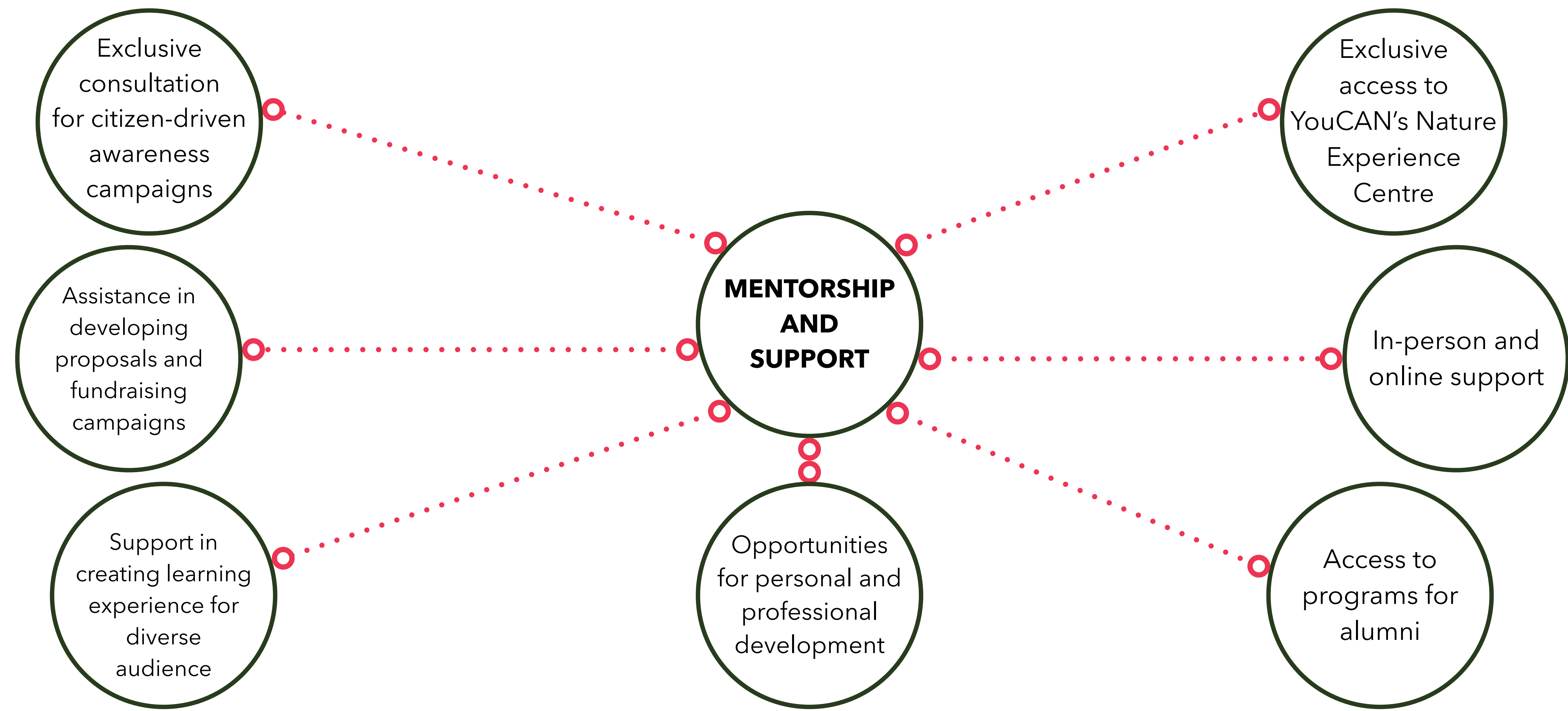

MENTORSHIP AND SUPPORT FOR THE LONG-TERM ENVIRONMENTALISM JOURNEY

YouCAN will provide guidance, mentorship, and support after the program for 5 to 10 years. You will join an amazing group of alumni who have already begun their journey as Earth Educators.



WHO ARE WE LOOKING FOR?

We believe that the genesis of future earth educators already exists. It is our duty to discover them and nurture their development for the service of our Nation’s natural wealth. We are looking for young people across India for the 2022-23 cohort, who are:

Emerging grassroots conservationists leading campaigns

Schoolteachers passionately educating students about nature

Early career youth with a budding volunteering experience in environmental conservation and/or education, outreach, and community work

Young naturalists looking for a foundation to build their careers in the fields of environment, sustainability, and conservation.

Other Criteria:

- ◆ Minimum 12th Standard pass
- ◆ Ages 18-35 years (with exceptions)
- ◆ Basic English communication is needed
- ◆ A stable source of financial sustenance

Duration of the Fellowship:

June 5th, 2022 to April 24th, 2023

Requirement:

- ◆ 20 hours a week; including educational sessions in schools/communities*, 4 times a month.
- ◆ Travel and availability to the first residential workshop - 7 days, second residential workshop and the public event - 4 days.
- ◆ A working smartphone and/or laptop with a stable internet connection.

Equity is one of our core values. We define this as being fair and impartial towards gender, caste, race, faith, language, and orientation. Hence, we help women and other disadvantaged groups to apply

OUR SELECTION PROCESS

The purpose of our selection process is to find the next generation of environmentalists, conservationists, and educators across Tamil Nadu, India.

The entire process is designed to allow our participants to showcase their connection with nature, volunteering experience in environmental conservation and/or education, and their readiness for this program.

..... Round 1 - Online application

Fill in English or Tamil. Applications launch on April 22th, 2022.

..... Round 2 - Video interview

Interviews will begin on May 20th and run-up to June 1st, 2022.

..... Round 3 - Pre-arrival exploration

June 5th to June 16th, 2022

..... Round 4 - Announcement of Earth Educators Cohort, Generation 3

June 18th, 2022

FEES AND CONTRIBUTION

We know that this is the last decade to restore our planet's health and stop the climate crisis. Yet, experiential learning programs such as the one we offer aren't mainstream yet. So our desire is to make this unique program accessible to everyone. We invite participants to consider joining this program as an investment in themselves toward their journey as an environmentalist.

The actual cost per participant of the Earth Educators Fellowship program comes to around 1.5 lakhs. However, to support people across Socioeconomic backgrounds, we are providing 100% merit-based scholarships for the 2022-23 cohort, thanks to the funding support of the National Geographic Society.

We do not want a lack of money to be a hindrance between you and the change you want to make for a better environment.

We will collectively create ways to find and support young volunteers for the environment, emerging conservationists, passionate teachers, and upcoming naturalists from every nook and corner of India even if they can't pay to participate in this program.
